^aA special historical case is presented by the specialty of General Practice [**Allgemeinmedizin**], which has been a recognised specialty in Germany since 1968. Until 1992, the completion of postgraduate medical training in general practice was not a prerequisite to open a practice as a general practitioner and register with the statutory health board: a doctor with 6 months of working experience was allowed to work as a general practitioner under the label "practical doctor" [**Praktischer Arzt/Ärztin**]. Historical differences also existed between the German Democratic Republic and the Federal Democratic Republic: East German doctors received a professional title [**Diplom-Mediziner/-Medizinerin/Dipl. Med.**] automatically after graduation from medical school. These differences are still visible when visiting former East German states, as physicians kept their titles in the unified German medical system.
